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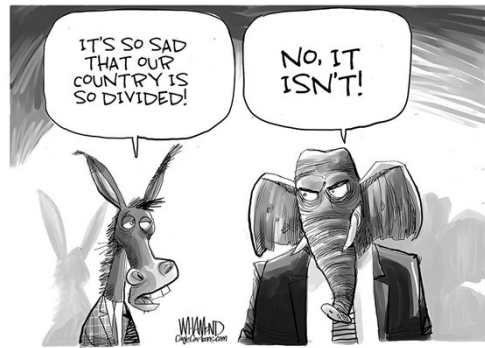
## 2022 Election Results

### Senate

- 51 Democrat
- 49 Republican

### House

- 222 Republican
- 213\* Democrat



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## Who Left?

Retired/ Other Office/Lost Primary: 68 (38 D, 28 R)

Resignation/Death: 18 (9 D, 9 R)

>19% of Congress

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# Incumbent Advantage

100% Senate incumbents won

- First midterm since 1934 where the party in power defended every Senate seat.

97% of House incumbents won

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# Redistricting

States that lost a seat: CA, IL, MI, NY, OH, PA, WV

States that gained seat(s): CO, FL, MT, NC, OR, TX (2)

- NY attempt to draw hyper-partisan lines was replaced by Court likely costing Dems 4 seats
- Gov. DeSantis' backed lines likely led to 4 more GOP seats

# 65<sup>th</sup> Congress (1917-1919)

- Republican control of the House by 1 seat however, Democratic Speaker
  - 215 Republicans, 214 Democrats, 3 Progressives, 1 Independent, 1 Prohibitionist and 1 Socialist (never permitted to take his seat)
- Passed bad laws, perhaps worst of all time
  - Declared War on Germany
  - 18th Amendment prohibiting alcohol
  - Espionage Act, the Sedition Act, and the Selective Service Act.



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## 72<sup>nd</sup> Congress (1931-1933)

- Republicans held majority in the House, 218-216, along with one member of a third party.
- Before the start of the 72nd Congress, 14 members-elect died, including the incumbent speaker, Republican Nicholas Longworth.
- The resulting special elections to replace them shifted the balance of power to the Democrats, 219-212.

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# Race for Speaker

# 218

Leader of the House of Representatives

Second in line for the Presidency

Does not need to be a sitting member of Congress

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# Race for Speaker

Kevin McCarthy was elected Speaker in the 15<sup>th</sup> round of voting but a very narrow margin after making numerous concessions to hardline conservatives.

Most ballots (133) for speaker was in 1855 electing Speaker Nathaniel Banks. Conflict over slavery and a rising anti-immigrant mood contributed to the deteriorating political climate.

Expect this fight to foreshadow upcoming debt ceiling fight – likely around August.

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## Career and Technical Education

- Expand career and technical education
  - In 2018, NRCA successfully urged Congress to pass legislation to reform/expand Perkins CTE grants
  - Perkins grants fund CTE programs at state and local level
  - Increased funding:
    - \$52 million in FY 2021
    - \$45 million in FY 2022
    - \$50 million in FY 2023

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## Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act

- Congress began work on reauthorizing the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)
  - WIOA programs help displaced workers obtain skills and find employment
- NRCA supports reforming and expanding to increase effectiveness
  - Increased funding - \$50 million in FY 2023
  - Expand access by streamlining bureaucracy and expand role for competency-based education programs
  - More employer representation on workforce boards at state level

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# Immigration Reform



- Maximize effectiveness of H-2B visa program
- Essential Workers for Economic Advancement Act New - visa system to meet employer workforce needs
- Two-track system: employer tests market and obtains permit; workers qualify for new 3-year H-2C visa
- Provide permanent legal status for TPS and DACA individuals

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# Tax Policy

- Tax Cuts and Jobs Act (TCJA) of 2017
  - Lowered tax rates for both corporations and pass-through businesses
  - Increased limits on Section 179 expensing and expanded definition to include non-residential roofs as eligible property (began Jan 2018)
  - Doubled estate tax exemption
- Make permanent expiring TCJA provisions
  - Sec. 199A pass-through deduction expires 2025
  - Maintain full expensing for non-residential roofs under Sec. 179



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# Regulatory Issues

- Work with federal agencies to minimize regulatory burdens
- Primary focus is the Occupational Safety and Health Administration which has been most active with new regulations and enforcement



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# Energy efficiency and sustainability



Opportunity for increased funding and demand for energy efficient and sustainable products and systems through the Inflation Reduction Act and Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

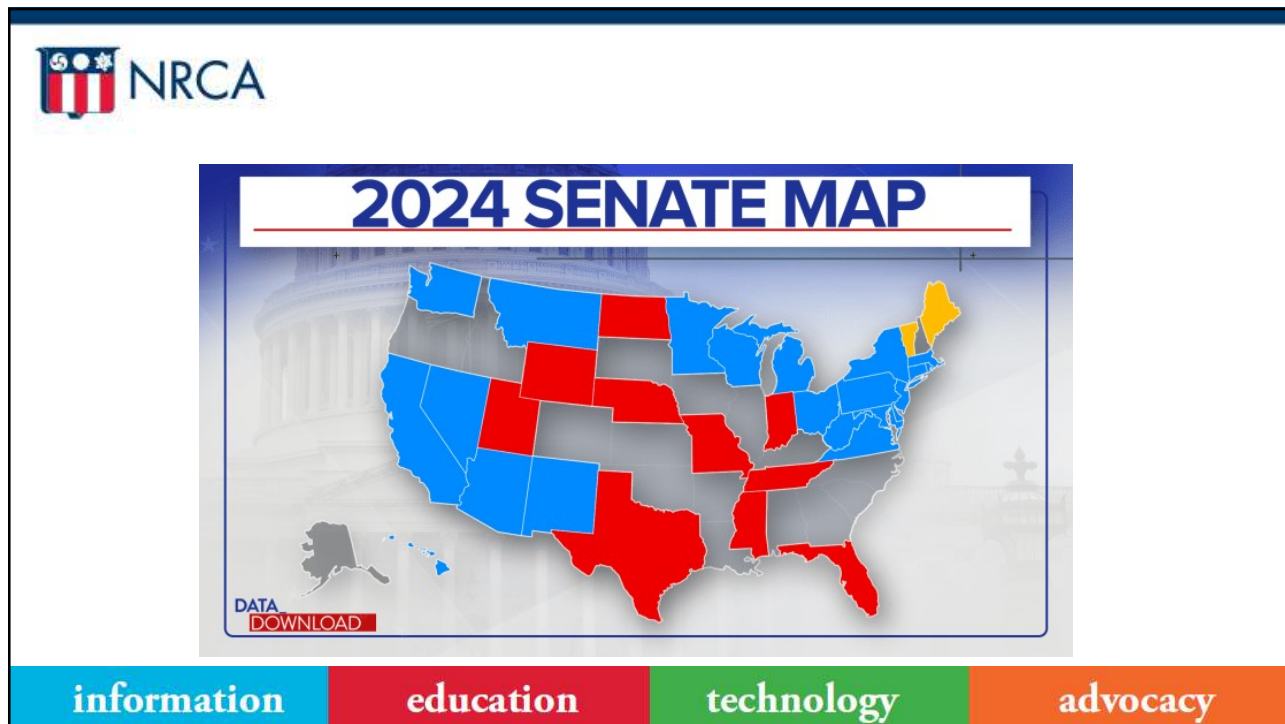
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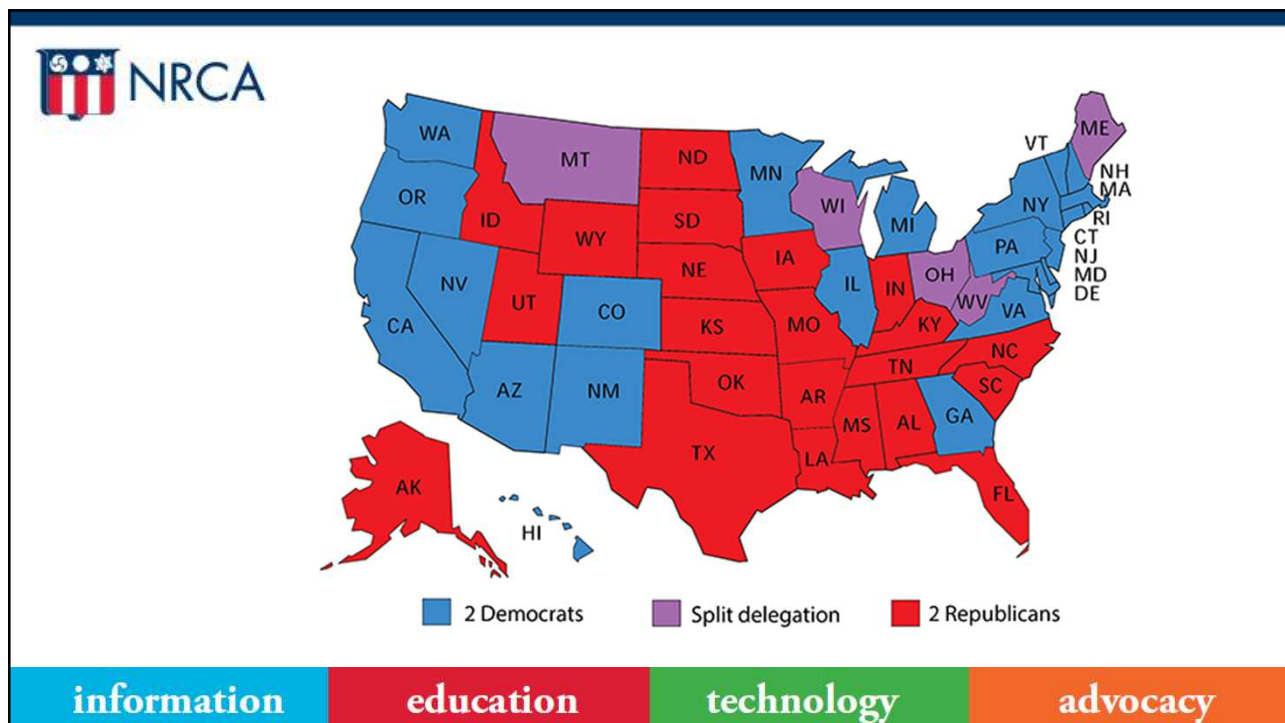
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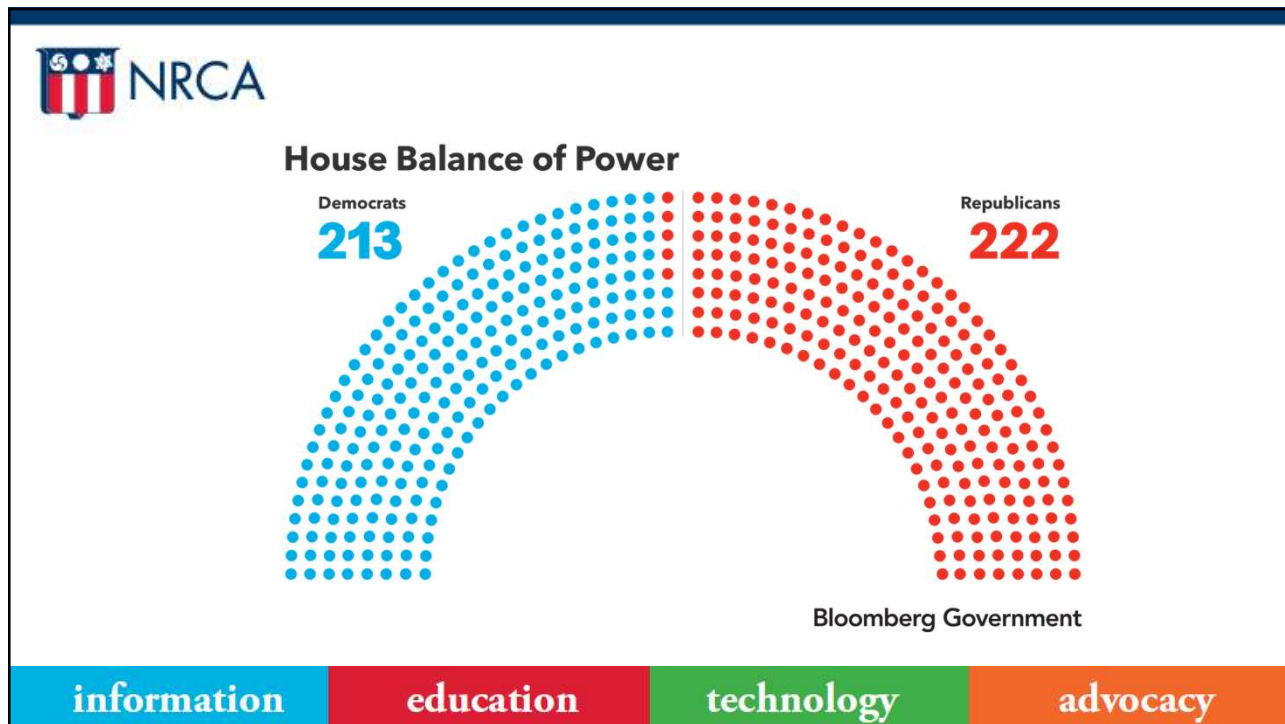
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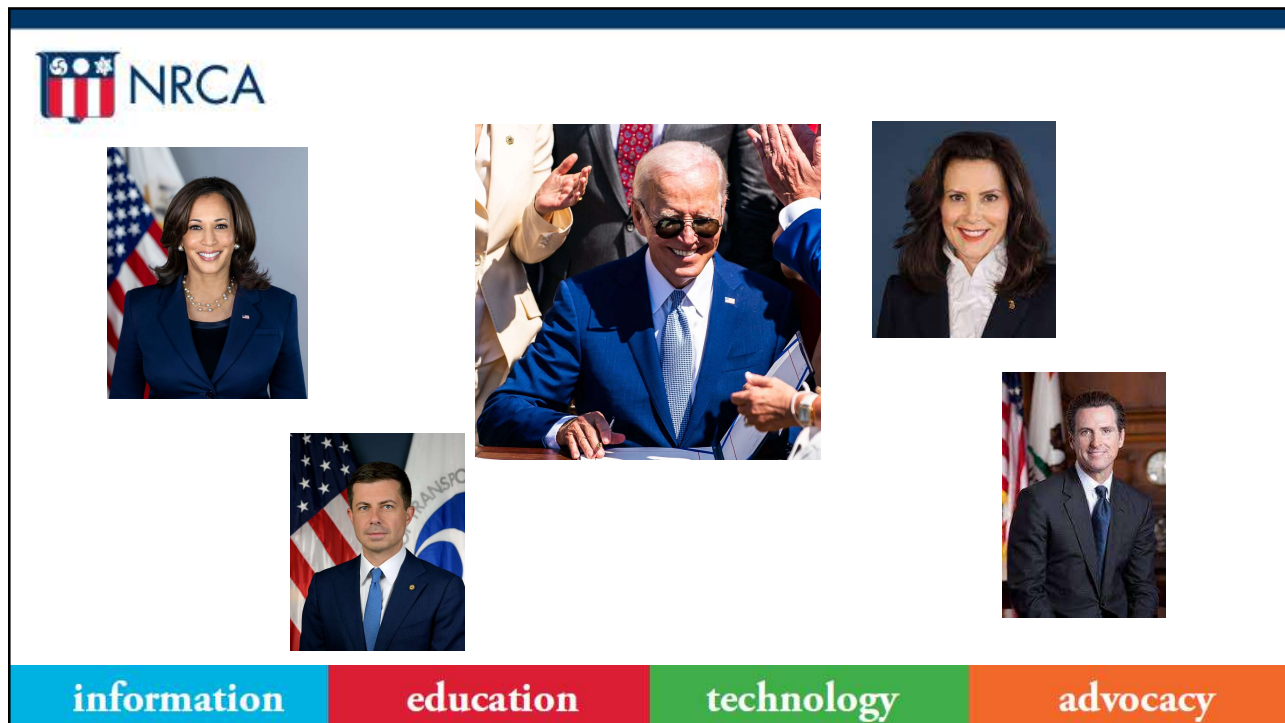
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## NRCA Advocacy

- Invested in members of Congress now in top leadership roles
- Supported historic investment in energy efficiency and sustainability
- Prevented increases in taxes on Corporations, protected the 199A pass-through deduction.
- Secured increased funding for Career and Technical Education Perkins Grants
  - Secured funding for the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act
  - Ensured construction was not left out of H-2B visa program and other immigration reforms
    - Prevented PVC from being classified as a hazardous waste.

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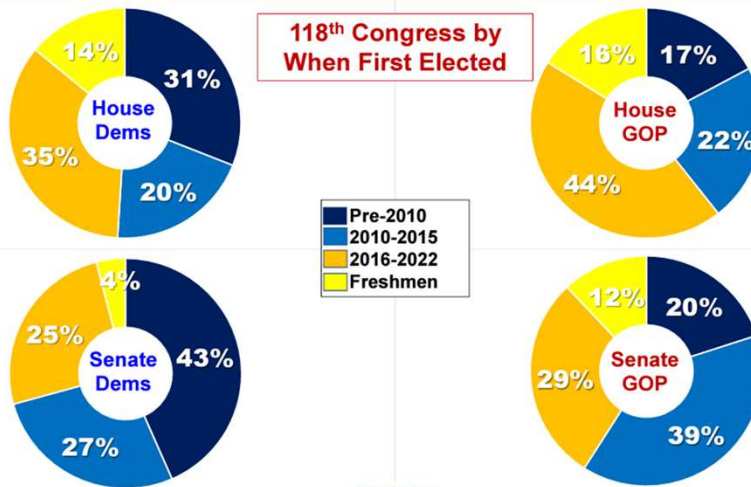
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118<sup>th</sup> Congress by When First Elected

ROOFPAC is the only PAC dedicated to supporting the roofing industry's interests in Washington, D.C.

During the 2021-2022 election cycle, ROOFPAC raised \$419,028 with a success rate of 94% of ROOFPAC-supported candidates on the Nov. 8, 2022 ballot having won their elections.
